M.Div. Program Goals with SLOs and QEP SLOs Integrated

Louisville Seminary intends that students in this program:

(1) gain knowledge and understanding of the Christian Scriptures and the ability to use critical skills to interpret them in contemporary social and cultural contexts

SLO1: Students will be able to interpret Scripture critically and imaginatively.

(2) gain knowledge and understanding of the history of Christian experience and historical and contemporary expressions of Christian theology in the context of the Seminary's commitment to the Presbyterian Church (USA) and the Reformed tradition, guided by an ecumenical and global vision of the church

SLO2: Students will demonstrate an understanding and appreciation of the global history of the Church.

SLO3: Students will demonstrate an understanding of multiple theological perspectives, historical and contemporary.

SLO4: Students will demonstrate an understanding of their denominational heritage.

(3) develop an understanding of the contemporary social and cultural context in which they will do ministry and develop the ability to reflect critically and constructively on the theological and ethical choices it poses in light of the reality of social injustice and ecological destruction in a global context

SLO5: Students will demonstrate a beginning ability to read and interpret a variety of cultures.

SLO6: Students will demonstrate an ability to recognize systemic racism, corporate and individual, and their own participation in it.

SLO7: Students will give evidence that they are conscious of multiple forms of oppression and injustice, including sexism, patriarchy, classism, heterosexism and poverty and able to identify strategies for responding to them.

SLO8: Students will demonstrate the ability to think theologically, strategically, imaginatively, and contextually about ethical issues.
