Notes from the Academic Support Center

As you begin your reading assignments for the semester, begin to gather bibliographic information from your sources, then when you refer to your notes for paper writing later in the semester, you'll have your source information readily available.

Taking notes from sources

Create a list containing the full bibliographic information from each source, even if you are unsure if you're going to use it in your paper.

This information includes

For books: author, full title of book, name of editor, place of publication, publisher, date of

publication, page numbers of your reading as well as your specific citations.

author, title of article, title of periodical, volume or issue number (or both), Periodicals:

publication date, page numbers (make sure you give the entire page length of the

The internet: author's name, document title, date of Internet publication, URL, date of access.

Record the bibliographic information on the pages where you are summarizing the book or article. Later you won't have to "match up" the bibliographic information with the synopsis.

Summarize the book or article in your own words. If you use the author's words be sure to put quotation marks around the quote. This will help to avoid the problem of plagiarism.

Just sum up the material. Do not add your opinions until later. When you do add your opinions, somehow mark them so that you will be able to tell the difference between your ideas and the author's. You might try writing your ideas in the margins or with a different color pen.

Include the bibliographic information on any photocopies that you make. You could just copy the cover and the copyright page.


