Course Description

Various perspectives on the developmental process will be examined from the fields of theology, psychology, sociology, marriage and family therapy, and literature. Attention is given to the growth of cognitive structures; psychosocial, moral, and faith development through the life span; issues surrounding the family life cycle; and various models of transformation, both personal and systemic. The course encourages students to reflect on their own developmental experiences in light of their religious heritage as well as to explore the implications of course content for their ministries of pastoral care and counseling.

Objectives/competencies include enabling students

- 1. to understand the principles of human development such as gender development, family development and processes; diversity; power, privilege, and oppression (2.1.1)
- 2. to recognize contextual and systemic dynamics (e.g., gender, age, socioeconomic status, culture/race/ethnicity, sexual orientation, spirituality, larger systems, social context) (1.2.1)
- 3. to demonstrate critical thinking about developmental theories, models, and perspectives;
- 4. to demonstrate a preliminary ability to integrate these factors into clinical observations that relate to eliciting a relevant and accurate biopsychosocial-spiritual history to understand the context of the clients' problems (2.3.8) and that help identify clients' strengths, resilience, and resources (2.3.10).
