NT 2043: EXEGESIS OF GOSPEL OF JOHN IN ENGLISH FALL 2018

CATALOG COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course analyzes one of the documents that comprise the Johannine corpus, namely the Fourth Gospel. By means of close readings of selected passages from each of its four major sections, we will explore the Gospel's topics, theological themes, and orienting concerns, together with the cultural worlds that are reflected in its production. A particular concern will be to develop awareness of how the Gospel of John has been construed differently to positive ends across various meaning-making communities, as well as ways in which particular interpretations of John have historically perpetuated systemic injustice.

LEARNING GOALS

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- ✓ responsibly interpret the English text of the Gospel of John with greater fluency and competency, employing contemporary New Testament exegetical methods in coordination with relevant scholarly research (SLO 2, 5);
- ✓ identify important Johannine topics and theological themes in constructive connection with their own religious tradition(s) and identified interpretive concerns (SLO 3);
- ✓ understand ways in which the Gospel of John has been interpreted in Christian traditions other than their own (QEP-SLO 1b);
- ✓ articulate important elements of at least one religious tradition other than Christianity (i.e., Judaism) (QEP-SLO 1a); and
- ✓ recognize and refute ways in which the Gospel of John has been interpreted in support of systemic injustice (SLO 4).

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- (1) **Preparation, Attendance, and Participation** (20% of final grade)
 - (a) Success in this course and the caliber of conversation in class depend on the careful advance preparation and thoughtful participation of all participants. Together we will seek to cultivate a brave learning space in which all voices are welcome and all viewpoints charitably and constructively engaged.
 - (b) Appropriate preparation and participation will include (i) leading opening prayer once during the course; and (ii) written responses to weekly discussion questions circulated prior to each class.
 - (c) Failure to participate sufficiently or to attend class regularly will impact the final course grade negatively. See the Attendance Policy section below.
- (2) **Content Quiz** (10% of final grade)
 - (a) Early in the semester, a straightforward, short quiz will be given in class on basic aspects of the Gospel of John. In order to prepare for this quiz, you should read the Gospel in full at least two times before the quiz. Ideally, your first reading should be done in one sitting, which should take approximately two hours.
 - (b) **Due date: Thursday, Sept. 20
- (3) Outline of Gospel of John (1 single-spaced page, 15% of final grade)
 - (a) Prepare an outline that divides the Fourth Gospel into what in your judgment are its constitutive chunks, including (a) chapter and verse numbers and (b) your own section headings.
 - (b) **Due date: Thursday, Oct. 4
- (4) **Micro-Exegesis Paper** (4 double-spaced page paper; 25% of final grade)
 - (a) Focusing on the text of John 7:53-8:11, state an exegetical thesis with ethical implications and build an argument defending it in conversation with Thompson, your Chosen Commentator, and (at least) two additional commentators.
 - (b) If you would like constructive feedback on a (complete!) rough draft of this assignment, please submit it to the Instructor by Thursday, Oct. 18.
 - (c) **Due date: Thursday, Nov. 1
- (5) **Exegetical Project** (30% of final grade)
 - (a) Choose one of the following options:
 - i. Written, 10-12 minute (i.e., 1,200-1,400 word) Sermon + (Revised) Micro-Exegesis Paper
 - ii. Detailed, one-hour Bible Study lesson plan + (Revised) Micro-Exegesis Paper

- iii. 750-1,000 word Op-Ed + (Revised) Micro-Exegesis Paper
- iv. Extended Exegesis Paper (10-12 double-spaced pages)
- v. Scholarly Research Paper (15-20 double-spaced pages)
- vi. Some other non-literary project approved in writing by the Instructor prior to Thursday, Nov. 8
- (b) **Due date: Thursday, Dec. 6

Hard copies are not a sufficient alternative or indication of work completed. Any handouts or other printed materials necessary for class presentations must be copied in sufficient numbers for all course participants.

DEADLINES / LATE PENALTIES / EXTENSIONS

All assignments are due on the dates listed in the Course Schedule. Although it cannot be rewarded, early submission is encouraged and appreciated.

Late submission of written course assignments will be accepted with the following penalties: after the beginning of class but within 24 hours, reduction of one full letter grade (i.e., A- to B-); after 24 hours but within 48 hours, reduction of two full letter grades (i.e., A- to C-). Written course assignments submitted over 48 hours late will not be accepted in any circumstances without appropriate documentation and direction from the relevant LPTS administrator. Non-written course requirements, such as class presentations, must be completed on the negotiated date and cannot be rescheduled without appropriate documentation and direction from the relevant LPTS administrator in advance.

Extensions to deadlines for written course assignments will only be considered in advance (i.e., prior to a given deadline). They will only be granted in "extraordinary circumstances," as outlined in the Seminary catalog and according to the procedure explained therein. Truly "extraordinary circumstances" are, by definition, rare.

- ✓ One-inch (1") margins on top, bottom, left, and right of all pages.
- ✓ All text formatted in Times New Roman 12-point font, black color.
- \checkmark One line break between paragraphs, with first lines indented half an inch (0.5").
- ✓ Double-spaced, except for block quotations, which must be single-spaced and indented half an inch (0.5").
- ✓ Align all text on the left. Do not right justify any text.
- ✓ Page numbers indicated in Arabic numerals (1, 2, 3...) at the bottom of all pages except title page. The main body of a paper begins with page 1.

✓ Bibliography of all works cited, formatted according to Seminary standards and style guide, should be presented on a new page immediately following the final main page of the assignment. If no works are cited, no bibliography is needed.

Electronic files must be saved and submitted in Microsoft Word DOCX format (not PDF). Improperly formatted assignments will be returned for revision according to the guidelines listed above and resubmission within 24 hours. Assignments that are not promptly revised and resubmitted will not be graded and will earn the grade of zero (0).

USE OF INCLUSIVE LANGUAGE¹
